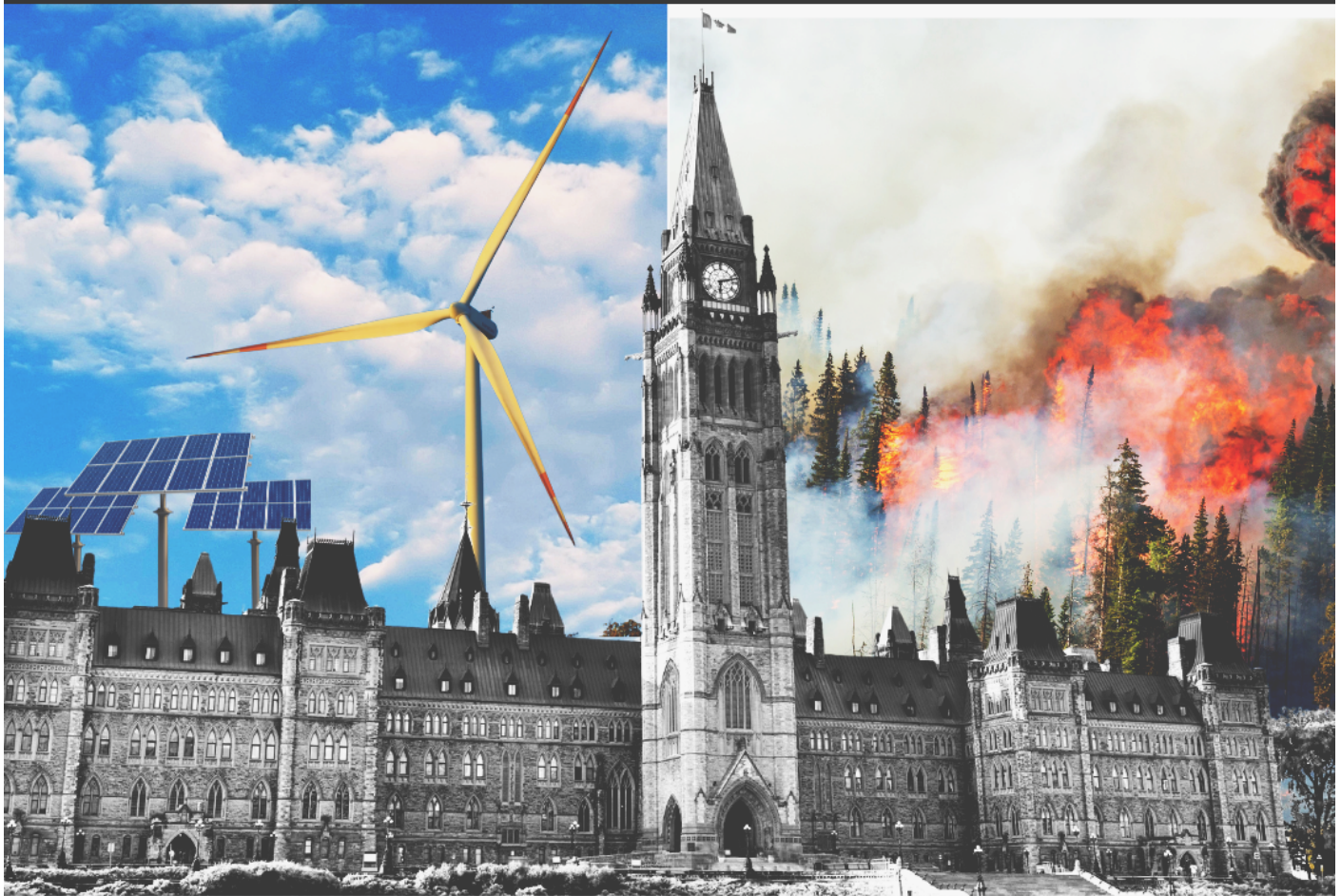

The People

Today we have gathered and we see the cycles of life continue. We have been given the duty to live in balance and harmony with each other and all living things. So now we bring our minds together as one as we give greetings and thanks to each other as People.

Now our minds are one.

The Earth Mother

We are all thankful to our Mother, the Earth, for she gives us all that we need for life. She supports our feet as we walk about upon her. It gives us joy that she continues to care for us as she has from the beginning of time. To our Mother we send greetings and thanks.

Now our minds are one.

The Waters

We give thanks to all the waters of the world for quenching our thirst and providing us with strength. Water is life. We know its power in many forms—waterfalls and rain, mists and streams, rivers and oceans. With one mind we send greetings and thanks to the spirit of Water.

Now our minds are one.

The Fish

We turn our minds to all the Fish life in the water. They were instructed to cleanse and purify the water. They also give themselves to us as food. We are grateful that we can still find pure water. So, we turn now to the Fish and send our greetings and thanks.

Now our minds are one.

The Plants

Now we turn toward the vast fields of Plant life. As far as the eye can see, the Plants grow, working many wonders. They sustain many life forms. With our minds gathered together, we give thanks and look forward to seeing Plant life for many generations to come.

Now our minds are one.

The Food Plants

With one mind, we turn to honor all the Food Plants we harvest from the garden. Since the beginning of time, the grains, the vegetables, beans and berries have helped the people survive. Many other living things draw strength from them, too. We gather all the Plant Foods together as one and send them a greeting and thanks.

Now our minds are one.

The Medicine Herbs

Now we turn to all the Medicine Herbs of the world. From the beginning, they were instructed to take away sickness. They are always waiting and ready to heal us. We are happy there are still among us those special few who remember how to use these plants for healing. With one mind, we send greetings and thanks to the Medicines and to the keepers of the Medicine.

Now our minds are one.

The Animals

We gather our minds together to send greetings and thanks to all the Animal life in the world. They have many things to teach us as people. We see them near our homes and in the deep forests. We are glad they are still here and we hope it will always be so.

Now our minds are one.

The Trees

We now turn our thoughts to the Trees. The Earth has many families of Trees who have their own instructions and uses. Some provide us with shelter and shade, others with fruit, beauty and other useful things. Many peoples of the world use a Tree as a symbol of peace and strength. With one mind, we greet and thank the Tree life.

Now our minds are one.

The Birds

We put our minds together as one and thank all the Birds who move and fly about over our heads. The Creator gave them beautiful songs. Each day they remind us to enjoy and appreciate life. The Eagle was chosen to be their leader. To all the Birds—from the smallest to the largest—we send our joyful greetings and thanks.

Now our minds are one.

The Four Winds

We are all thankful to the powers we know as the Four Winds. We hear their voices in the moving air as they refresh us and purify the air we breathe. They help to bring the change of seasons. From the four directions they come, bringing us messages and giving us strength. With one mind we send our greetings and thanks to the Four Winds.

Now our minds are one.

The Sun

We now send greetings and thanks to our eldest Brother, the Sun. Each day without fail he travels the sky from east to west, bringing the light of a new day. He is the source of all the fires of life. With one mind, we send greetings and thanks to our Brother, the Sun.

Now our minds are one.

Grandmother Moon

We put our minds together and give thanks to our oldest Grandmother, the Moon, who lights the nighttime sky. She is the leader of women all over the world, and she governs the movement of the ocean tides. By her changing face we measure time, and it is the Moon who watches over the arrival of children here on Earth. With one mind we send greetings and thanks to our Grandmother, the Moon.

Now our minds are one.

The Stars

We give thanks to the Stars who are spread across the sky like jewelry. We see them in the night, helping the Moon to light the darkness and bringing dew to the gardens and growing things. When we travel at night they guide us home. With our minds gathered together as one, we send greetings and thanks to all the Stars.

Now our minds are one.

The Creator

Now we turn our thoughts to the Creator, or Great Spirit, and send greetings and thanks for all the gifts of Creation. Everything we need to live a good life is here on this Mother Earth. For all the love that is still around us, we gather our minds together as one and send our choicest words of greetings and thanks to the Creator.

Now our minds are one.

Closing Words

We have now arrived at the place where we end our words. Of all the things we have named, it was not our intention to leave anything out. If something was forgotten, we leave it to each individual to send such greetings and thanks in their own way.

And Now our minds are one.

BACK AGAIN IN OTTAWA FOR THE 28th TIME

(Or something like that. We have lost count.)

Why, after all these years, are we still fighting to transform our economy away from fossil fuels?

We know that nearly 90% of people want climate action. Yet, bad-faith actors, backed by the fossil fuel industry, continue to distort public opinion, especially on social media, creating a false perception of opposition.

But here's the good news: we still have time to act.

How do we make it happen? Right now, our government hears from fossil fuel companies 986 times in a year like 2025. They need to hear your voice, too.

As a constituent, you have the right and the power to speak with your MP about your concerns. We bring expert data on how to transition our economy, backed by nearly 16 years of experience facilitating meaningful discussions between constituents and their parliamentarians.

When we lobby, the primary goal is to build trust and continue to have ongoing meetings with our MPs. Our work is grounded in a proven theory of change. We employ various communication techniques to overcome barriers and drive progress. Since 2016, we've honed our motivational interviewing skills, which Dr. Renée Lertzman introduced to us that year. Nationally, since 2018, Vince Schutt has been our motivational interviewing guide, and because of him, we have a team at CCL Canada that is well-versed in this critical skill.

We also follow the data. Last December, Senator Rosa Galvez joined us to discuss her Climate Aligned Finance Act, a nation-building bill for the 21st century. This is the kind of bold leadership we need, and we want to make sure it becomes the law of the land.

We are in a time of massive change for economic and energy systems. It can feel chaotic, but the path forward, even in systems not in equilibrium, is predictable. In January, Simon Sharpe showed us how at this time in history we can accelerate the energy transformation at least five times faster.

The key: we must ensure our MPs understand that their constituents demand federal policies to redirect finances away from fossil fuels. The data are on our side. The time is now. We must give our MPs the courage to act and let them know we have their backs if they do.

Thank you for joining us on this journey, from me to we, by following the money.

Together, we are about to turn the tide.

The Elephant and the Rider

Key Insights

1. Humans typically make decisions **intuitively first**—and then use reasoning to justify those decisions afterward.
2. Reasoning feels like it's in charge because it speaks — but our faster **emotional response** is doing most of the real work.
3. Speaking only to the Rider — **"just follow the science"** — ignores the Elephant.
4. Facts work best when **trust is present** — not when identity feels threatened.
5. Understanding intuitive decision-making helps us sustain relationships and avoid hardening resistance.
6. We shift from **convincing** — to **connecting**.
7. **Self-awareness is the first step toward understanding others.**
8. Understanding **intuition** opens the door. Understanding **values** helps us walk through it — together.

Jonathan Haidt: The Elephant and the Rider

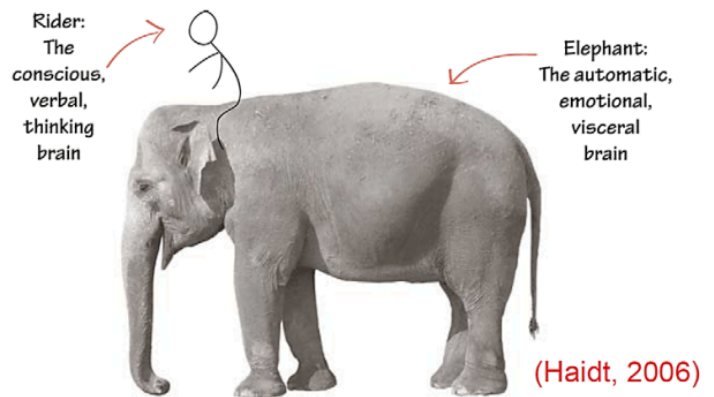
- The Elephant represents our emotional, intuitive mind. It's fast, automatic, and powerful.
- The Rider represents our rational, analytical mind. It's slower, logical, and controlled.

At first glance, the Rider seems to be in control. But the Elephant is much larger and stronger. When the Elephant decides to move, the Rider can only explain where it's going.

Understanding that people make decisions **intuitively first** and **rationally second** is essential because it reshapes how we approach every climate conversation. If we assume people change their minds because they simply "need more facts," we will keep talking past them —**and often strengthen their resistance.**

This insight allows us to shift from convincing to connecting. **Instead of trying to win an argument**, we learn to understand what matters to the other person and speak in a way that honours those values. Once someone feels respected and understood, their "Rider" (reasoning) becomes open to reflection and learning. Without that foundation, even the best policy explanations bounce off. It also keeps us grounded in humility. If our own decisions are shaped this way too — not just "other people's" — then BRIDGE becomes a practice of **curiosity, empathy, and partnership** rather than judgment or frustration. This mindset is what enables durable relationships with parliamentarians, coalition partners, and community members across lines of difference.

The elephant and rider concept sits at the heart of **BRIDGE**.



Pair and share: What emotional blocks do you have regarding climate policy? What elephant could your MP possibly be sitting on? Knowing this, how can you best build trust with your MP?

The Six Moral Foundations: Understanding Others by Understanding Yourself

Key Insight: You are never starting from zero with anyone. You already share a moral language; the task is simply learning which "dial" they tend to turn up.

Now that we've explored how our minds form beliefs, we can examine Moral Foundations Theory (MFT), a well-researched framework for understanding intuitive reactions to issues like climate change.

MFT helps us think about the values shaping our emotional, intuitive side. Research shows, people start with moral intuitions—quick feelings about right or wrong, safety, or fairness—not logic.

MFT identifies six moral dimensions: care, fairness, loyalty, respect, sanctity, and freedom. We all use these, but prioritize them differently, which shapes our attention, emotions, and trust in policies.



MFT gives us a universal toolkit—not for understanding one political group, but for understanding people. Every person is more complex than any category we put them in, which is why these tools work best when we use them with curiosity and humility about each individual's story.

Try It: Identify the Foundation

Let's see if you can identify which moral foundation is being expressed in the following examples:

"It's our patriotic duty to protect our borders."

"We must ensure everyone has access to healthcare to prevent unnecessary suffering."

"We need to speed up the energy transformation so we can protect people from the harms of climate change as quickly as possible."

"Communities deserve a fair, transparent process so projects are built with accountability and respectful consideration of community input/priorities."

"Canada should lead the world in clean energy innovation—it strengthens our national security and global competitiveness."

Open Letter: Civil Society Urges the Government of Canada to Participate Meaningfully in the Santa Marta Conference on Transitioning Away from Fossil Fuels

Dear Minister Dabrusin,

As you are likely aware, the governments of Colombia and The Netherlands are convening the first International Conference on the Just Transition away from Fossil Fuels in Santa Marta, Colombia on April 28 and 29. This conference will bring together country officials, industry leaders, community members, civil society, and other stakeholders to discuss pathways to a fossil fuel free future. As Canada has been invited, we are writing to you now asking you to show leadership and foresight.

Why Canada Should Attend

The Santa Marta Conference is **unprecedented**. For the first time, a coalition of countries will actively discuss **how to transition away from fossil fuels** to preserve climatic conditions compatible with planetary boundaries. Further conferences are already planned to address the real-world challenges of the transition.

Canada stands at a **pivotal moment**. The world is undergoing a **profound rupture**, and the rules-based international order is no longer sufficient to protect our interests or values. As Prime Minister Carney articulated in Davos, "**variable geometry**"—building flexible coalitions of the willing—is the only viable path forward.

We urge you the minister to attend and actively participate in a collaborative manner in developing a roadmap to phase out fossil fuels globally.

Given the recent decisions of the Canadian government in favour of fossil fuels and the glaring gap between global climate action and what is required to avoid the worst impacts of the climate crisis, we want to use this opportunity to call on you to increase the ambition of our domestic climate commitments and publicly release your plan for meeting those goals.

Our future depends on your leadership today. Together, we can build a **fairer, cleaner, and more resilient future** for Canada and the world.

Lobbying 101

Pivoting Towards the Defined Lobbying Asks

The focus of your meeting is outlined in the lobbying asks. Our priority is to follow the money and advocate for policies that redirect funding away from oil and gas.

If “triggering” topics arise—such as carbon capture and storage, pipelines, or nuclear energy—or if topics unrelated to our asks but important come up—such as EVs, East-West grid, or the Greener Homes Grant—the following statements can help you gracefully pivot back to your lobbying focus.

- “That’s beyond the scope of what we’re here today to talk about. Let’s get back to the task at hand.”
- “There are other people and organizations working in that area, and they’d be better equipped to speak to it.”
- “I’m not as well versed on that topic, but I can talk to you about the need to transition away from fossil fuels as fast as possible.” (Or “about renewable energy,” etc.)

In general, just think about a comfortable way that you would pivot away from these topics if a politician brings them up while lobbying.

Getting ready to lobby

Important information to capture all in one place.

1. Contact information of the MP - include the staffer’s name, email and phone number
2. Names, roles and contact information of all lobbyists. See table below
3. Motivational Interviewing Questions
4. General Agenda of your meeting
Introductions, Appreciation, How much time do you have?, The Ask, Possible motivational interviewing questions. Note this part might go off script depending on the politician and where she/he/they lead the conversation. Wrap up. Photo. Follow-up
5. Post-meeting reflections: the 5-7 most important takeaways from the meetings. What did the politicians say that jumped out at you? Let everyone reflect.

Ask how, who, what, when and where questions. Avoid why questions. Get the other person talking. The politicians should be doing most of the talking.</p>	
<p>Meeting Outline Beginning: thanks, how much time, intros, appreciation, state our purpose and ask. Middle: exchange thoughts, Motivational Interviewing, questions, listening for values, and moving MP forward. End: clarify supporting ask(s), plans for follow-up, photo, and thank them for time. Specifically ask them a closing question such as <i>Can we count on your to support climate aligned finance?</i> If the politician seems hesitant you can tell them we operate under <i>Chatham House Rules</i> and we will not share publicly anything they say to us unless they instruct us otherwise.</p>
